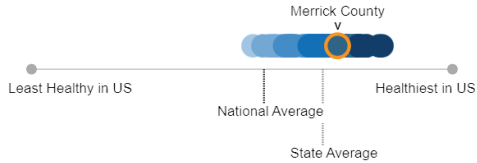
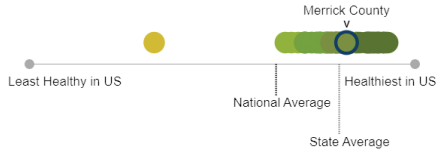


Merrick County



Each Nebraska county with sufficient data is represented by a dot, placed on a continuum from least health to healthiest in the nation.

The color of each dot represents data-informed groupings of counties nationwide with similar **Population Health and Well-being** or **Community Conditions** on the continuum.

Population Health and Well-being: Merrick County is faring about the same as the average county in Nebraska and better than the average county in the nation.

Community Conditions: Merrick County is faring slightly better than the average county in Nebraska and better than the average county in the nation.

Merrick County

The County Health Rankings & Roadmaps data release provides a snapshot of the health of each county in two summary scores: **Population Health and Well-being** (which measures length and quality of life) and **Community Conditions** (which measure issues that can shape population health and well-being). Each county is placed on a continuum from least healthy to healthiest in the nation and is categorized into a health grouping of counties with similar summary scores. The following tables illustrate the “drivers” for the health of this county.

What do these drivers mean?

The drivers indicate the measures with the greatest impact on the health of the county, according to the CHR&R model of health and county performance. Drivers labeled with a green plus sign are measures where the county performed better than the average of counties nationwide. Drivers labeled with a red minus sign could be improved and may warrant additional attention. The Direction of Impact is not determined for counties with insufficient data.
